While summer is an amazing time for camps, vacations, and relaxation, it is also a great time to curl up with a good book! As you know, good readers and writers read and write DAILY. Recent brain research shows us that practice is necessary in order to master strategies that are critical to the success of the reading and writing process. The more you read, the more proficient you become at reading and writing!

This summer, you will read TWO engaging and modern novels: *Ghost* by Jason Reynolds **OR** *The Insignificant Events in the Life of a Cactus* by Aven Green. Both of these novels are full of heart and laughs. They'll keep you wanting to turn the page all summer! You will also read *The Hero's Guidebook* by Zachary Hamby in preparation for our hero's journey unit in the fall. This is an quick, light read that will help set the foundation for our first unit.

For your first novel, you'll complete a One-Pager project. On the page below, you'll find a list of detailed directions for your project. Read it carefully to make sure you've completed all pieces and parts of the assignment. This is a project grade and NOT something you can throw together last minute. While the novels chosen for you are not long, it is important you pace yourself throughout the summer so you finish your assignment in a timely manner. DO NOT just give surface-level information. This project should demonstrate your critical thinking skills and show an in-depth analysis of the novels.

You will also have a scavenger hunt to complete for *The Hero's Guidebook*. You will find most success with this assignment if you complete it AS YOU READ.

All projects are due the first day of school!

One Pager Project Directions

All work must be only on one side of a small poster.

For each novel on both the left and right side, complete the following:

- _____ 1. Write the title and author of the novel. You may design and decorate this however you choose.
- _____ 2. Start with a border that reflects a major symbol in the novel. (Symbol—an object that represents the character in some way)
- _____ 3. Write THREE MEANINGFUL quotes. Remember, you must cite your quote with the author's last name and the page number. Ex: "The moon was beautiful and bright in the sky" (Sasser, 145).
- _____ 4. Include your analysis of the quotes (explain their importance/meaning) and explain their importance to the story. This should be 3-5 GOOD sentences.
- _____ 5. Draw TWO visual images for the novel. These could be a character or a moment from a scene. You may also choose to draw symbols that convey an idea about the novel.
- _____ 6. Underneath EACH image, EXPLAIN what you drew and its connection to the novel. This should be 3-5 GOOD sentences.
- _____ 7. Write a poem about the novel, a character, or the theme. Your poem should be 8-10 lines. You may write any type of poem you wish (free verse, rhyming, acostic, etc.)
- _____ 8. Personally connect to the novel with an "I believe" statement. This could be anything you believe after you have completed reading the novel.
- _____ 9. Choose one word that shows the theme of the novel (growth, family, friendship). Explain how this theme is displayed in each novel in 3-5 GOOD sentences.
- _____ 10. Draw a picture of the main character from the novel and make 5 bullet points of their character traits
- _____ 11. Draw a picture to represent the conflict (main problem) the main character faces. Explain that conflict in 3-5 GOOD sentences.

IMPORTANT FOR ENTIRE PROJECT:

Your One-Pager should be colorful and neat. Your entire page should be filled with these elements. **No space should be left blank**, and **nothing should be left in pencil**.

Grammar and spelling should be accurate.
